

Sure, John Denver called West Virginia "almost heaven" in his song "Take Me Home, Country Roads" back in the 1970s. But what's up with the Mountain State today? Awesome adventures, that's what.

West Virginia's mountains, forests, and streams are your outdoor playground, with more than 30 state parks renowned for their scenery and mountain-bike trails. Rock climbers scale Seneca Rocks in Pendleton County and the New River Gorge's Endless Wall in Fayette County. Historic trains chug visitors into the wildest places in the East. Rafters and kayakers experience the New River Gorge and many other streams. Anglers casting for smallmouth bass and trout choose from streams that national fishing magazines consider must-visit destinations.

So to give you a glimpse of what West Virginia has to offer, we're highlighting nine fun destinations and their varied adventures and events. But for even

Adventure Galore at the Summit

irst, we have to mention the Summit, also known as the Summit Bechtel Family National Scout Reserve. A 10,600-acre high-adventure base operated by the Boy Scouts of America and located in Southern West Virginia right in the middle of some of the most spectacular country east of the Rocky Mountains, the Summit offers every adventure you can

think of in one outstanding location. And starting in 2013, the property will become the permanent home of the national Scout jamboree. Although it's a day's drive (or less) from many large cities in the East, this wild area is one of the best-kept secrets in the United States.

So what's going on there? Where to start... Located near the New River Gorge, which

is forever protected by the National Park Service, the area's streams, mountains, and forests are a haven for those who love outdoor sports. Mountain bikers will ride the Summit's "High Gear" downhill course and the 27 miles of



cross-country trails on the "Low Gear" course. Whitewater rafters will float the New River Gorge's class III, IV, and—yikes!—V whitewater. Rock climbers will flock to the Gorge to scale the Endless Wall along its north face. Fishermen will float the New River and many other streams to engage in the world-class, smallmouth bass fishing. Summit visitors will also find a

lake for canoeing and kayaking, zip lines, BMX and mountain biking, scuba diving, a water obstacle course, and even a stadium area for outdoor concerts and events.

Planners say the site will be ready for the 2013 National Scout Jamboree, which begins July 15. The expected 50,000 Scouts, including as many as 10,000 adult volunteers, will make the Summit the second-largest city in West Virginia from July 15-24. To register or check out the cool activities taking place at the jamboree, go to summit scouting org.

An Amusement Park and More




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Take a break from your natureoriented excursions and head
to Camden Park in Huntington.
Camden boasts more than 30
rides and attractions, including
a rollercoaster, a haunted house,
and more (866-822-6336, camden
park.com). Or for a slower-paced
afternoon, visit the Heritage Farm
Museum (304-522-1244; heritage
farmmuseum.com). This Huntington museum showcases Appalachian heritage through interactive
displays. The shopping area down-

town is also worth checking out. The stores and specialty shops in downtown Huntington also offer a variety of one-of-a-kind items, many crafted by local artisans.

For an interesting lunch or dinner experience stop by Hillbilly Hot Dogs, which was recently featured on The Food Network. A large menu with an interesting dining experience that has fun with rural Appalachian culture (hillbillyhotdogs.com; 304-522-0044).

line counties make up this swath of wild country and small towns. In Monroe and Greenbrier counties, you'll experience unspoiled wilderness along the Allegheny Ridge. Mercer, Summers, Raleigh, Fayette, and Nicholas counties lie in the New River Gorge region—also where the New, Bluestone, and Gauley rivers flow. McDowell and Wyoming counties boast the southern mountains, which are the heart of the Coal Heritage Trail (coalheritage. org), an area well known

for its outdoor adventures.

MERCER COUNTY GETAWAYS

West Virginia's Mercer County sits nestled in the heart of Appalachia. Outdoor enthusiasts recognize the area for its scenic hiking and mountain biking trails, fishing, and festivals. The community of Lyburn is a gateway to the Hatfield-McCoy Trails (go to trailsheaven.com for details). Mercer County also contains Camp Creek State Park and Forest (800-CALL-WVA, camp creekstatepark.com), which has fishing, picnicking, and playgrounds. If flyfishing's your thing, call Riverbound

X-Stream Fly Fishing in Princeton at 304-487-3303. For winter activities, check out the Winterplace Ski Resort in Ghent near Beckley (800-607-SNOW, winterplace.com). If you'd just like to see the scenery in an old-fashioned way, step aboard the Ridge Runner Train in Bluefield (304-327-2448, theridgerunner. org). Ridge Runner Train is only open on weekends, April-September.

Tamarack's Arts and Crafts

In Tamarack, billed as the nation's "first showcase of handcrafts, fine art, and regional cuisine," you'll find 59,000 square feet of shopping that features—in addition to the products for sale—working art studios for resident artisans, a 178-seat theater, a fine art gallery, and "A Taste of West Virginia" eatery. Many of the craft people here cre-



ate their unique works while you're watching. It's a taste of rural Americana worth a visit between your outdoor adventures: for the beautiful, heirloom-quality handcrafts such as glass, Appalachian quilts, pottery, and carved furniture. Tamarack is located at Exit 45 off of I-77/I-64 in Beckley. Get more information at 1-88-TAMARACK or tamarackwy.com.

See Bears and More at West Virginia Wildlife Center

Upshur County in north-central West Virginia—just west of the million-acre Monongahela National Forest—exudes small-town charm, especially in the downtown Buckhannon Historic District. It's home to the West Virginia State Wildlife Center, a zoo with a twist. Operated by the Wildlife Resources Section of the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources, the Wildlife Center provides realistic interactions with native wildlife. Just take a wheelchair-accessible, 1.25-mile trail through a

mature hardwood forest and keep your eyes peeled for black bears, bobcats, eagles, deer, and more. Don't worry; they're inside spacious enclosures. The Wildlife Center also features a gift shop, picnic facilities, and a pond filled with bluegill and catfish. Find out more by calling 304-473-1400, or going to **visitupshur.org**.

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Fun on the Water

f variety is the spice of life, then make Summersville your destination. Summersville Lake offers an abundance of water activities, including fishing,

swimming, kayaking, boating, scuba diving and more! The lake is the largest clear-water lake in the state, with 60 miles of shoreline, and boasts 68–80 degree temperatures from June to September. Popular

spots for swimming, snorkeling and scuba diving include Bubbles Cove and Long Point, which *Skin Diver Magazine* has called "The Little Bahamas of the East." Boat rentals are available at Sum-

mersville Lake Marina and Summersville Lake Retreat. Sarge's Dive Shop is also open for scuba gear and more.

If you're looking for high adventure, try zip lining, rock climbing, or whitewater rafting. Summersville is also rich in Civil War history, and you'll want to save time for a walk on one of the many beautiful trails. Even

West Virginia Time Travel


The Durbin & Greenbrier Valley Railroad offers mountain rail adventures on several trains from April to December. The trains depart from the historic depots in Durbin and Elkins, and offer an opportunity to earn the Railroading merit badge.

The Durbin Rocket, a 55-ton steam locomotive built in 1910, is powered by Old No. 3, one of only three operating Climax-geared logging locomotives still in service. She puffs her way along the Greenbrier River. Scout troops are invited to camp at the Scout Camp, located in the remote forest along-side the river. The Rocket drops off and picks up on scheduled run dates.

From Elkins, the diesel-powered New Tygart Flyer climbs up to a 150-foot-wide waterfall. The 1920-vintage Cheat Mountain Salamander follows the same route as the Flyer but climbs into an even more remote wilderness where Scouts can camp. The Great Cheat Mountain Train Race is scheduled for July 13, 2013. Diesel and steam trains will compete to honor West Virginia's 150th birthday.

The American Mountain Theater offers a perfect way to relax after a day on a train. It can also help your boys earn their Music merit badge (requirement 3A).

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
